NATIONAL ACE BIRD AWARDS

2024 AMENDMENTS

The Australian National Racing Pigeon Board (ANRPB) is pleased to announce that as from this year (2024) they are looking to award an Australian pigeon that achieves the best performance in an individual Federation and or Combine of Clubs that has a minimum membership 20 competing fanciers with the title of "National Ace Pigeon".

Apart from the previous year, where there was only two awards the ANRPB has decided to include and "Over all distances National Ace Bird Award".

As federations generally recognise and present an award/trophy to the owner of their Federation's "Bird of the Year", the ANRPB would like to encourage that all Federations and/or Combine Clubs forward the <u>best three results</u> of their individual organisation's "Bird of the Year" to the ANRPB who will mathematically compare all nominated birds using the European method adopted and recognised around the world as being the preferred method to determine an overall "National Ace Bird" that will compare large federation bird entries from various locations along with small bird entries from smaller organizations.

They do this by working out the "Lowest Mathematical Coefficient" for each nominated bird over a number of races that does not favour or discriminated whether the nominate bird competes against a large or small number of birds.

This is done by dividing the place taken by the nominated bird (for each of the 3 best results submitted) and dividing each result by the number of birds in each race and then multiplying that number by 100 – **Example:** the said bird takes 10th place racing against 3650 birds, mathematically the lowest coefficient for this race looks like this; 10 divided by 3650 multiple by 100 = 0.2739726 this then is the "Coefficient" for this race.

You then do this for the other two race results, then add them together and divide by 3 to get the Average Lowest Coefficient for the 3 races which would then identify the winning pigeon. e.g. for the second race this bird may take 2^{nd} place against 2900 birds and the coefficient for that race would be 0.0689655 and for the third race result submitted this bird may have run 5^{th} with a bird entry of 3200 the coefficient for this race being 0.15625 these three results are then added together and divided by 3 e.g. 0.2739726 + 0.0689655 + 0.15625 = 0.4991881 divide this by 3 = 0.166396 this being the lowest average coefficient that would determine the winner.

Sponsorship has already been secured for all three award categories that will include Trophies (Kindly donated by Pat Arcella of San Remo Lofts), a Framed Photograph by John Debrincat Pigeon Photography and a Certificate of Merit for the three category winners, this along with Certificates of Merit to be presented to the Top 10 nominated birds in each of the three categories, "Short to Middle", "Middle to Long" and "Overall".

These awards will provide the opportunity for fanciers to compete on a level playing field with the top ten winning birds in each category gaining national regonition.

The ANRPB would like to wish all fanciers all the best for 2024 and look forward to receiving your bird's nomination.

In the "Short to Middle National Distance Ace Bird Award" (80km to 500km) category the nominated bird must be clocked three times within the nominated distance, this can be twice from the same race point/distance, but third clocking must be from a different race point/distance with the 80 to 500km distance.

In the "Middle to Long Distance National Ace Bird Award" (501 to 900+km) the nominated pigeon must be clocked twice from a race point/distance from any two races within this distance 501 to 900+km.

Additional/New Award

To be awarded the "National Over all distances Ace Bird Award" (80km to 900 + km) the nominated pigeon must be clocked at least three times, either once in the "Short to Middle Distance Category" (80km to 500km) and twice in the "Middle to Long Distance Category" (501 to 900+km) or vis-versa i.e. twice in the "Short to Middle Distance Category" and once in the "Middle to Long Distance Category"

All nominations need to be on the Official ANRPB Nomination Forms that can be downloaded from the ANRPB website, or from your own Federation or Club website and signed by the relevant officials as highlighted on the forms. All Nominations need to be received by the 31/1/25.

Please note:

All birds nominated for any of the National Ace Bird Awards MUST BE the first clocked pigeon to the loft. Birds entered into special races i.e. Ring Races, Breeders Plates and/or Squeaker Sales etc. DO NOT count unless they are the fancier's first bird clocked to the loft. Double ups i.e. 1st club, 1st Ring race does not count as two races.
