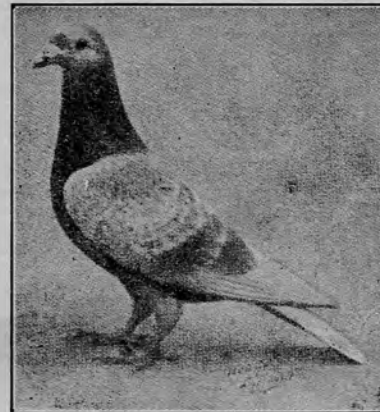

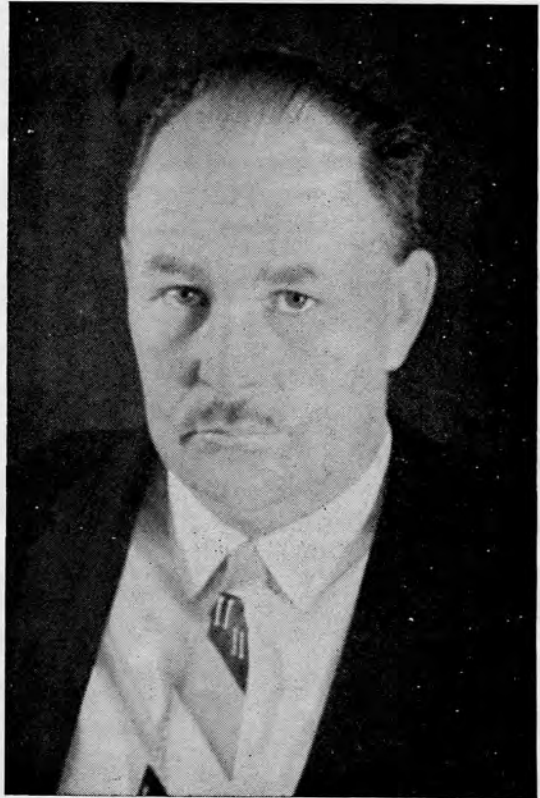

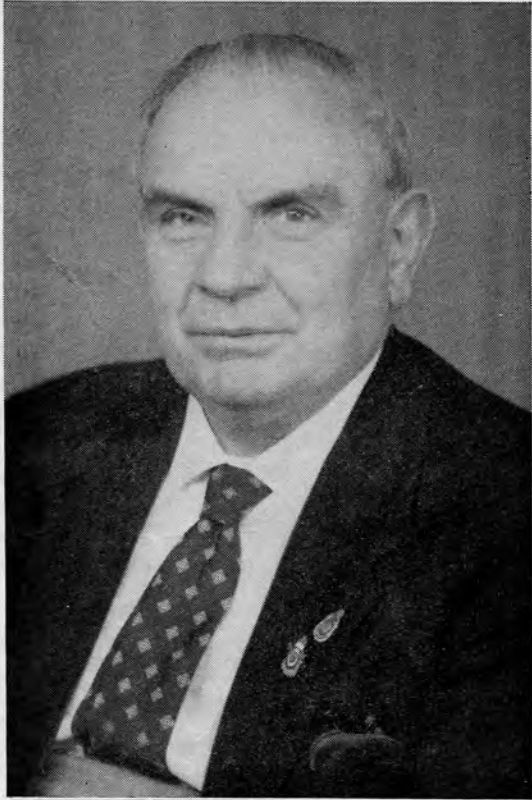

The method of management—The birds are trained around the house night and morning. About 5 weeks before the first race, he trains Two Wells then 2 tosses from Malalla, and onto Bowmans. He seldom trains past this point or Monarto South and Tailm Bend on the South. Ces is a heavy feeder, feeding 45% Peas, 50% wheat and plenty of grit, salt, greenfeed and 5% Barley.

Some Don'ts for Beginners

- DON'T** Forget to repair chains on Club Hamper Doors.
- DON'T** Forget to look at your club troughs for leaks.
- DON'T** Let birds drink impure water.
- DON'T** Feed stale or frosted greenfeed.
- DON'T** Leave an ailing bird with healthy ones.
- DON'T** Chop and change your methods during racing.
- DON'T** Seek advice off unsuccessful fanciers.
- DON'T** Be a bad loser or bragging winner.
- DON'T** Forget to give birds (nesting) bath water to prevent dead squeakers in eggs.
- DON'T** Be afraid to pay the price for a good bird. Let quality and not quantity be the guiding factor.
- DON'T** Forget to look in the loft last thing at night to see if all's well.
- DON'T** Forget to keep the loft locked.
- DON'T** Handle tiny squeakers any more than necessary.
- DON'T** Leave all the club jobs to the other members.
- DON'T** Be late at your Club Hampering Nights.
- DON'T** Be afraid to write to the Combine about any racing, breeding or club problem you may have.
- DON'T** Feed Pigeons by weight.
- DON'T** Be a one line flyer as they are no good for any club.

An ideal food for racing and breeding is made by a mixture of food here, which add up to 18% proteins. When preparing a mixture of grain for your birds during racing season, it is unwise to feed a protein content of more than 18%, as more than this will thicken the birds blood and impose a strain on its heart during flight. To determine the exact protein content, divide the number of different grain in the mixture into the total number of proteins shown on the pigeon food table, as under example:

1 Part Peas	22
1 Part Tares	26
2 Part Wheat	24

$$\div 4 / 72 = 18\%$$

Divided by four parts used and protein contents is 18% as above.

OUR FIRST COMBINE £100 OODNADATTA WINNER, 1959

In winning our first, guaranteed first prize of £100, race from Oodnadatta. Peterhead's crack flier, Ces Dunstan, once again proved his consistency in hard, long distance races. Ces has been racing successfully for over 30 years, and in this time has built up a team of long distance racers second to none in this state. In his years of racing Ces has won from every race point that has appeared in the programmes, having won the Peterhead Club Points on many occasions, including the year when this club was the strongest club in S.A. Ces has recorded many positions in our Combine races before he finally won our £100. Ces has built up three distinct families: Marriot, Gits and Harrisons. All three families are proven long distance pigeons, but each family shows their best under different weather conditions. This is why Ces is to be always found amongst the winners, no matter what the velocity. The £100 winner is a beautiful blue bar hen, and a very fine example of Ces' Marriot family, a family that has won over £2,000 in prize money to this loft alone. A full sister to the winner scored 8th in the same race. The winner, a yearling, had her first race from Parachilna and was placed in the Port Adelaide Marree Derby before going to the big race. Hens are exercised at daybreak each morning then given open loft for some three hours before being fed in. Cocks are then given open loft for the day. Birds are tossed regularly at all points of the compass by road early in the season and given a Monarto South or Bowmans by rail whenever it is considered necessary during the racing season.

The Master Clock

First station in the state and first station in Australia to broadcast master clock time for pigeon races.

The master clock used by the S.A. Homing Pigeon Combine is provided by Radio Station 5DN.

The method employed is as follows:

Clocks are set up on the Friday night and all centres wait for the broadcast at 8 p.m. The announcer commences calling the seconds five seconds before the clocking on time, and for clocking off on the Saturday or Sunday the same method is employed.

I am given to understand that Station 5DN is the first radio station to give this service in Australia. It has been a great asset to the combine and has saved many miles and hours of time. Previously it was necessary to visit clocking centres with a portable master clock.

Station 5DN's release broadcast on Saturdays, which is given at 12 noon, is also appreciated by Combine members. We are indebted to this radio station for the wonderful community service they give and for the 1961 season this popular station will again be heard giving pigeon fanciers released details, weather forecasts and providing the master clock times.

HOW TO WORK OUT VELOCITIES

On checking a competitors clock we find that his bird has taken 2 hours 22 min, 45 seconds to fly 79 miles, 1,016 yards. In order to obtain his velocity properly, we do the following. Reduce his flying time of 2 hours 22 minutes, 45 seconds to 60ths of seconds. On checking the table we note 2 hours, 22 minutes = 8,520 + 45 secs. = 8,565. After finding his flying time in 60th we must reduce his distance of 79 miles 1016 yds. to 60ths. With the aid of the table we find that:

79 miles reduced to 60th	- - - -	8,342,400
1,016 yards reduced to 60ths.	- - - -	60,960

8,403,360

Finally the flying time is divided into the distance as follows:

8,403,360 divided by 8,565 = 981 y.p.m. velocity.
